
NEW Nickels Intermediate

After nearly three years of construction, the new Robert L. Nickels Intermediate School building opened to students and staff for the 2023-24 school year. Byron Center Public Schools invited the community to celebrate the grand opening of the new building and to see the history of BC live on.

The 134,000 square foot facility is home to 5th and 6th grade BCPS students. The new building is equipped with flexible learning spaces, breakout rooms, brand new technology, and a state-of-the-art gym, cafeteria, and classrooms for music, art, and STEM.

Free breakfast and lunch

Byron Center Public Schools is excited to offer free breakfast and lunch to students for the 2023-24 school year, thanks to the Michigan School Meals Program.

Every BCPS student K-12 gets one breakfast and one lunch free of charge every school day. Second meals and a la carte items are not included and must be purchased separately. Please visit Family Portal to view a student's account, check the balance, and make deposits.

Additional full-price meal costs:

Breakfast (grades K-6)	\$1.75
Breakfast (grades 7-12	\$2.00
Elementary and Nickels Lunch	\$2.50
Middle School Lunch	\$2.75
High School Lunch	\$3.25



Free and reduced meal application

Even though meals will be provided for free, it is important for BC families to complete the free and reduced meal application on the Family Portal in order for BCPS to receive full access to federal and state funding for educational programs.

The free and reduced meal application determines the amount of federal funding for the district, impacting all students.

Benefits of completing the Free and Reduced Meal Application:

- Increased funding to support your child's school
- Discounts on pay-to-participate fees for qualifying student athletes
- Additional funding for technology and internet access
- Discounts for fees associated with college application process
- Discounts for SAT, ACT, and AP testing fees, along with scholarship opportunities
- Discounts on Chromebook Care Plans for qualifying families
- Possible EBT cards
- Discounts on fees associated with credit recovery




